THE GEORGE H.W. BUSH EXHIBIT GALLERIES

The museum's exhibits reveal the unique influences and challenges that shaped George Bush's life and presidency. Through artifacts, film, photographs, documents, music, sound effects and interactive videos, this special museum experience encompasses much of U.S. history since 1941. As you explore the museum, be sure to take time to view a real World War II Avenger Torpedo Bomber, a 1947 Studebaker, a slab of the Berlin Wall, and precise replicas of President Bush's Camp David, Oval Office and Situation Room.

The museum spans a total of 18,500 square feet, including a 2,900 square foot changing exhibit gallery. With fascinating activities, audio/video elements and artifcats, the presidential exhibits document George Bush's exceptional leadership during times of crisis, including the reunification of Germany, the collapse of the Soviet Union, and the Gulf War. The importance of family, friends and politics are a part of the museum's colorful story, while the overall theme of the museum is the nobility of public service exemplified by the lives of George and Barbara Bush.





Explore items ranging from a 1925 film of George H.W. Bush's first steps in Kennebunkport, Maine, to records and memorabilia from his tenure as the 41st President of the United States. In addition, a special section is dedicated to former First Lady Barbara Bush and her efforts on behalf of literacy, AIDS awareness and prevention, and volunteerism.

The museum also has a classroom designed to accomodate for students in kindergarten through high school. A staff education coordinator combines Texas social studies curriculum with drama, art and written expression to create programs that teach students about the presidency, American history and government.



Like the other Presidential Libraries, the George H.W. Bush Presidential Library and Museum is also a research institution. Fully integrated into the academic environment of Texas A&M University, the library's collections include more than 44 million pages of official and personal papers, 2 million photographs, 2,500 hours of videotape, and 100,000 museum objects. These rich primary sources document George Bush's distinguished public career as U.S. congressman, ambassador to the United Nations, chief of the U.S. Liaison Office in China, chairman of the Republican National Committee, director of the Central Intelligence Agency, vice president, and president. Over the years, those initial collections have been augmented by other important historical materials, including a small collection of Federal Records and more than 90 donated collections, including President Bush's personal papers from World War II to the present.



These materials are preserved and made available for research and museum exhibitions. Together, they document the life and career of George Bush and form an important historical record of the critical years in the late 20th century.
